Commemorating James Lind and his inaugural clinical trial to identify lemons and oranges as a cure for scurvy, ICTD is a celebration of clinical trials and research. Patient Research Experience Survey (PRES) Update

The annual cut-off date for PRES is fast approaching. Our PRES target for 22/23, based on 3% of recruitment in 2021/22 is 455 survey responses. At present, we have recorded a total of 330 responses, meaning we need 125 more to reach our target. All surveys must be submitted **before Friday 31**st **March**. Whilst this does not provide us with a great deal of time to make up the difference, we are confident that we can do so. This will require a big final push from all our research teams who are administering PRES to their patients. Please be aware of this deadline and ensure that all surveys are uploaded well in advance. If you have a number of completed surveys and you are concerned that you and your team does not have time to upload them, please let us know as soon as possible. We have excellent PRCs who are on hand to help you with PRES as part of their role. This could be as a one off to upload a backlog of surveys, or on a more regular basis between now and the end of March.

Patient Research Champions (PRCs) Update

Since our current crop of PRCs have been active in their placements, the feedback we have received from both staff and patients has been overwhelmingly positive. We recently met with two new PRCs who thoroughly impressed us. Both individuals showed enthusiasm for the role and offer varied skillsets, which would be of great benefit to researchers and patients alike.
